Denver Public Schools -Leveraging Annual Reports

Accountability

- Annual reports accompany formal notice of concern to charter board
- Serve as basis for required remedy plan from charter board (may include interim performance goals)

Capacity Building

- Meetings with boards of schools not meeting expectations to go over report and specific performance concerns
- Interim performance goal setting with charter boards

Body of Evidence

Annual report becomes key part of the body of evidence considered at renewal

The board prepares for sustainability

- The board completes basic and on going training
- The board executes a proper development plan
- Members have at least 80% meeting attendance
- Members participate in VOA networks





Volunteers of America SAMPLE FINANCE STANDARDS

Monetary policy oversight is performed

- Fees are properly set
- Public funds are properly used
- Audits are free of findings
- The school demonstrates sustainability





Volunteers of America SAMPLE INDICATORS ON A FINANCE STANDARD

The school demonstrates sustainability

- The school has at least a 20% fund balance
- The school has a positive Current Ratio
- The school maintained or Improved Net Assets





Volunteers of America PUBLICATION AND USE OF REPORTS

- Schools share reports with publics
- VOA posts to Web in near future
- Newspaper articles on award winners
