In a recent report, <u>"Broken Mirrors"</u> by The Education Trust., Michigan ranked the third -worst out of 41 states the report examined for black student enrollment at four -year institutions in 2016. Only **8.7 percent** of undergraduate students at Michigan's 15 public universities are black, while it should be **17.1 percent**, according to the report. Additionally, black graduates make up a fraction of their white counterparts: In Michigan, 25.9 percent of African Americans have a college degree, compared with 41.6 percent of whites



The lowest percentage of black students were enrolled at UM (4.3 percent), Michigan State University (**7 percent**), and the **lowest** is Michigan Technological University (**1.1 percent**).

The six-year graduation rate for black students in 2016 was the worst at the institutions that enrolled the most black students: Wayne State University (**17.4 percent**), Saginaw Valley State University (**19.5 percent**) and Eastern Michigan University (**20.4 percent**).
